Corrosion Control Recommendation Requirements Not Met for Edgerton Waterworks

Edgerton Waterworks provides the drinking water to Fulton Utility District consumers. Edgerton Waterworks was required to complete a corrosion control recommendation for reducing lead in drinking water. Ninetieth percentile results of compliance samples for Edgerton Waterworks exceeded the lead action level during the most recent compliance period. The corrosion control recommendation required Edgerton to evaluate their water quality and recommend options for reducing lead in drinking water. They did not adequately complete this requirement by March 31, 2018.

What was the cause of the inadequate corrosion control recommendation requirement?

Edgerton did not clearly understand when the corrosion control recommendations were required by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR).

What is being done to correct the problem?

An updated corrosion control recommendation was submitted to the WDNR on April 16, 2018. The updated submittal has now been accepted and the City is working with the WDNR to complete the plan.
